R. route across the isthmus of Panama, also worked at his trade for a short time in Chile. Came to Oregon first in 1863. Mined in California and Idaho considerably, went from this county to Washington territory in 1869. Returned to this county in 1874, and remained here since. He lived at the Dalles for some time, was well known there, was a carpenter by trade.
